Please know that you are fully responsible for Lamb; your fleeces! Do not mail fleeces. Fleeces should be a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place for each class; grand champion skirted and properly bagged. N-CSA will provide cards and reserve champion awards for ram and ewe and best hidden from judge. Also, no alcohol is allowed on the premises. Campers must be out by 10 AM on Sunday. You are responsible for cleaning up after your animals! Water, bathrooms and an outdoor cooking area are available.

> Sheep entering Colorado should have a Veterinarian issued health certificate.
